We want today, to honour our British friends who have integrated so well our village and have fixed on this November the 11<sup>th</sup>, the traditional red poppy on their clothes as the symbol of those who died in this War.

Why a poppy?

The use of the poppy as the Remembrance flower, the "Poppy Appeal" was inspired by the World War I poem "In Flanders Fields" written by John McCrae: during the tremendous bombardments of the First World War the churned-up earth allows millions of poppies to grow. The battlefields were covered with these red spots reminding the lost lives of those who died...

The symbol remains and that is why, today we offer a wreath only composed of red flowers.



As we are all gathered here today, we also want to thank Noël Roux and the Festival Committee, which organized the votive festival this year, it was very successful and we will keep it in our mind!

Many thanks too, to Francis Da Ponte who made easier the access to the new memorial in creating this beautiful stone path.
